What a start to Euro 2020!

It was so lovely see the children and staff in their sports colours today, to kick off the Euro 2020 competition and to raise funds for the school. In **Year 5**, their geography unit includes a focus on clothes and where in the world they come from. Linked to this is their Design Technology unit - designing a T shirt. The children have started practising a variety of skills linked to sewing and stitching. Some have found it more challenging than others! We look forward to seeing their finished T shirts

towards the end of term.

Meanwhile, our **Year 3** children have been learning about their local area, in particular the changes being made to Enfield Town. They have planned and written letters to Councillor Michael Rye, who is also one of our school governors, about their views. Some of the children from 3B walked to the Civic Centre today, to personally deliver the letters. We look forward to hearing if they receive a reply.



Lateness and Poor attendance

We have noticed the same children repeatedly arriving and being collected late several times a week, as well as children taking regular days off school. From next week, we will be sending a text to individual parents reminding them of the school's expectations regarding attendance and punctuality.

Children who are regularly late, often miss the start of lessons and this can lead to lost learning. Children with less than 90% attendance have missed 19 days of schooling in a year and are classed as **Persistent Absentees**. Some interesting facts are listed below, for us all to think about.

The world is run by those who turn up.

Attending school every day = 100% attendance

Attending 4 1/2 days a week = 90% attendance = 4 weeks missed per year

Attending 4 days a week = 80% attendance = more than half a term missed per year.

Attending 3 1/2 days each week = 70% attendance = more than a quarter of the school year missed.

An average attendance of 80% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing a whole 2 years from school.

Being late for school reduces learning time.

If your child is 5 minutes late every day they will miss three days of learning each year.

If your child is 15 minutes late every day they will miss 2 weeks of learning each year.

On the last day of term, the children in **Nursery, Reception and Year 1** took part in Elmer Day. From the David McKee books, Elmer the Elephant has, for many years, been used as a way to help children celebrate differences in others. Elmer's positivity and brightness sends a message about how words of kindness can have such a wonderful effect on us all.

What else has been happening at school?

In **Year 3**, the children have been learning about Magnets and Forces. As well as learning new scientific knowledge and vocabulary, they also used forces on the trim trail and other areas of the playground. The children made their own magnetic games to play outside.



For our **Year 6** pupils, there was great excitement in the hall, when Mrs Pingram's husband set up a variety of science activities linked to their science unit on Electricity.



These activities included making an electro magnet and a human circuit.

The children also used a Wimshurst Machine and a Van de Graaff generator, which generate static electricity. The children had a great time trying out these fantastic machines. A huge thank you to Mr Pingram for sharing such wonderful machines and for his incredible knowledge of all things electrical!
